

Orphanage in India : the Premananda Orphanage Centre in Ongole, Andhra Pradesh, provides a home for more than 60 children who are drawn from the various religious traditions in that region. In recent years the orphanage has been developed and expanded to provide accommodation. Some of these children have made good progress in their education and are now studying at tertiary level. Professor Jon James, a former visiting scholar of St Edmund's College, is our link with the orphanage and sends a regular newsletter. In addition to the frequent collections, there is a scheme whereby the sum of £200.00 covers the education of a child for one year.

Street Invest Africa : Fr Patrick Shanahan, MAfr, helped to launch Street Invest which supports investments in children so that their rights, needs and potential can be fulfilled. He and his colleagues do this through the training of professional and committed workers who serve as trustworthy adults in the lives of street children and by contributing to the investments the workers and the children need to secure a real future. Street Invest believes in the potential of all children and the rights of all children as described in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC).

The Cogwheel Trust is a local counselling service for people coping with difficulties.

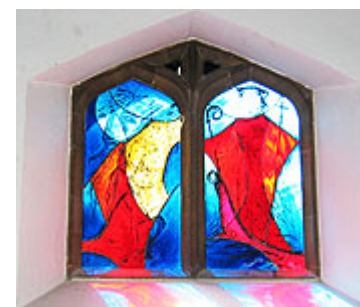
The Chapel General Purpose fund helps us to purchase Chapel furnishings and liturgical items as well as helping to pay the expenses of visiting preachers.

Cambridge Women's Aid : help is provided throughout the year to the Women's refuge, which offers shelter and support to victims of domestic violence; some families spend a relatively short time at the refuge and others stay for longer. Collections are taken throughout the year, especially during Advent.
